

Car show judging took place Friday. Everyone cleaned and wiped their cars, got in place and were ready to be judged. Friday was a beautiful sunshiny day.



## The Thirty Year Tribute: A View From Communications Central by Don Spindel

Unless you were intimately involved in the planning and implementation of this year's special 30 year anniversary tribute to the GTO, most of you are probably not aware of one of the "firsts" to occur at the 1994 GTOAA National - the debut of Communications Central. So what exactly is that? - just the question I asked when Cathey Pacelli, who spawned the idea, mentioned to me that she was looking for someone to coordinate this function.

Communications Central (alias "the communications center" or "the information room") was the nerve center of the meet, providing a vital communications link between the meet's key committee heads (i.e. registration, parking, security, swap meet, etc.) as well as informational services to the attendees. In three words, the objective was to be the meet's "information clearing house."

In preparation for *Communications Central* our task was to be familiar with the who, what, why, when and where of the meet. For example, we needed to know what events were taking place and who was in charge. We collected maps, brochures, promotional materials, condensed lists and noted the key times and schedules of events. In addition to having to have a fairly thorough knowledge of what was happening at the meet as well as who the key players were, we also learned (as we went along) that we needed to be somewhat better versed in providing suggestions, tips and general comments regarding restaurants, services and other points of interest in the immediate area surrounding the hotel.

Admittedly in a somewhat biased self critique, I think Communications Central was quite successful in fulfilling it's objective and very well received by those who utilized it. We answered hundreds of questions and helped to more efficiently coordinate dozens of people. At times, however, we did unknowingly give out some inaccurate and/or erroneous information. For example, the hotel shuttle was not as readily available for transfer or pickup of people as we were led to believe. Several guests were stranded and opted to use taxis or were inconvenienced by long waits. Furthermore, several shuttles to key publicized events generated significantly more interest than the shuttle capacity that was available at their highly promoted scheduled times. This led to a situation where people were left with no alternatives other than to find their own means of transportation, wait for a later shuttle (if available) or cancel the planned activity. We are deeply sorry for the miscommunications.

Using 20-20 hindsight, Communications Central was understaffed. My wife, Pat, Ron Fieberger, and myself bore the brunt of the workload assisted at times by various individuals who covered for us for brief intervals. What made the staffing somewhat challenging was: 1) this was the first crack at operating such a position so we weren't sure how many people we needed; and 2) the requirement to have people who were well immersed with the details of the event and familiar with the key players. All the people with the necessary qualifications were already heavily involved in other major tasks essential to the success of the meet.

Shifting gears (no pun intended), with respect to a general observation about the meet's overall work detail, it was very impressive to view the can do spirit and the untiring effort of an overworked group of key individuals from our GGTOA club (who shall go unidentified lest I forget a significant name). In addition, a super effort was put

forth by many friends and family of local GGTOA club members as well as volunteers from visiting GTO clubs. Nearly everyone ended up putting forth more energy than what was originally requested. It was gratifying to be a part of such an extraordinary effort in which there were so few (if any) complaints by those so actively engaged.

In addition to the favorable impression left by all the hard work put forth by Cathey and many others, my most memorable impression of the GTO Nationals is being interviewed by TNN. Confirming that it pays to be in the right place at the right time, I was flattered and thrilled to be able to spend at least 30 minutes with the production crew of TNN which was filming a special program, The World of Speed and Beauty, at Saturday's drag races at Gateway International. I was asked about the particulars of my 1968 meridian turquoise convertible and filmed driving the GTO along one of the service roads. It was exciting to have such a unique opportunity to show off my car.

In conclusion, I definitely believe all the hard work and energy that went into putting together this year's GTO Nationals was worthwhile. The event gave us all a great opportunity to get to know many of our GGTOA club members much better and to make acquaintances with other GTO enthusiasts from around the country. While I can't overemphasize the wonderful experience it was to be able to foster and enrich our people relationships, I'd be remiss if I neglected to mention the star attraction -- those vintage GTOs! It always gets my adrenaline going to see so many beautiful classic GTOs all in one place. In the final analysis, if we can't get excited about viewing these special "goats," there is no sense in participating in such a prestigious birthday party to celebrate our fun hobby of GTO collecting and driving.














#### From The Parts Bin by: Will Bowers


