GGTOA EVENTS PARTICIPATION POINTS SYSTEM

POINTS SYSTEM RULES:

- 1. Attendance at GGTOA sponsored or GGTOA participation events:
 - a. To receive the maximum points for event, members/associates must participate with their GTO, LeMans or Tempest
 - b. If a member brings one GTO and their associate brings a second, the max. points plus half the max. will be awarded.
 - c. If one member drives another member's GTO to an event, the owner receives the max. and the driver receives half of the max.
 - d. For any other situation, the decision will be at the discretion of the 'Officers'.
- 2. Members / Associates shall be responsible for signing the Official Attendance Sheet at all GGTOA sponsored / participation events. You must sign the sheet to get points!
- 3. Points shall be awarded only once per event even if event lasts more than one day.
- 4. Members / Associates must be able to provide proof of participation for any non-club event (entry form, dash plaque, race slip, etc.) or 'vouched for' by another member, if requested to do so by the 'Officers'.
- 5. Members / Associates shall have one month to inform the 'points score keeper' of their participation in any non club event. This will usually be documented on our sign-in sheet at the monthly meetings.
- 6. Points shall be tallied from November thru October of the next year so that awards can be presented at our annual Holiday Party.

AWARDS (award will be either a trophy, plaque or whatever is decided by 'Officers':

- Overall Points Winner / 1st Place
- First Runner-up / 2nd Place
- Second Runner-up / 3rd Place

DEFINITIONS:

<u>Attend with GTO</u> - Attend event with your 1964 - 1974 Pontiac GTO, LeMans, Tempest <u>Chairperson</u> - An individual responsible for organizing ALL aspects of an event for the club including refreshments, registration or entries, parking or meeting place, point of contact, trip coordinator, etc.

GGTOA Participation Events - Non-GTO events voted to be GGTOA participation events attended by two or more GGTOA members with GTO's.

GGTOA Sponsored Events - GGTOA hosted events.

100-Year Milestones

Here Are Some Important Cars Of The Last Century

One hundred years.

The U.S. auto industry has survived its first century and is going strong. At least it's going a lot stronger than it was 100 years ago, when the Duryea Motor Car Co., run by Charles and J. Frank Duryea, built a mere 13 vehicles and gave birth to the U.S. auto industry.

In honor of the industry's centennial, here's a look at some of the vehicles that have had a major impact on the U.S. auto industry during its first 100 years.

■ 1896 Duryea Motor Wagon. It's only fitting that this

vehicle head the list because it gave the U.S. industry its start. It was a two-seater with a 4-horsepower, 1-cylinder engine.

■ 1901 Curved Dash Olds. The Duryeas take credit for the first car, but the Olds Motor Vehicle Co. organized in Lansing, Mich., in 1897 takes credit for this first mass-produced car, which sold for about \$625. The Curved Dash runabout was powered by a 7-hp, 1-cylinder engine with a two-speed transmission. In 1901, 425 were produced and sold.

■ 1908 Ford Model T. The Tin Lizzie, as it be-

came known, is the car that put America on the road. By the mid-'20s nearly half the cars registered in the United States were Model T's. Through 1927, when they were discontinued, Ford sold more than 15 million of them.

■ 1941 Willys Jeep. The vehicle that helped win the war and was the precursor of the sport-utility vehicle started life as the answer to requests for government bids for a light weapons carrier/reconnaissance car. Known for being rough and rugged in its military garb, the Jeep's descendants — a few generations older and more civilized — are replacing cars as the vehicle of choice.

■ 1949 Volkswagen Beetle. "The People's Car," simple, basic transportation, appeared in the United States in 1949 with only two models, but, by 1973, topped the 15 million mark and overtook the Ford Model T as the world's best-selling car. It won a cult following, especially among youth able to tolerate its meager creature comforts, such as no gas gauge until 1962.


■ 1953 Chevrolet Corvette. The brainchild of GM styling Vice President Harley Earl, this fiberglass-body

car was born to be a low-priced rival to the Jaguar XK120. The car was approved for production in 1951 and shown in concept form at GM's 1953 Motorama in January of that year. A huge success, GM rushed it into production in June for introduction in late 1953. Only 300 1953s were built, all white with red interior, with a Powerglide automatic mated to a 150-hp, 6-cylinder engine.

■ 1964 Pontiac GTO. The GTO, based on the LeMans, thumbed its nose at a GM policy dictating distinct small-car and large-car engines. GM had banned engines larger than 330 cubic inches as standard in compact or midsize cars. So Pontiac offered a 389-cubic-inch, 325-hp V-8 as

an option in the midsize GTO, while making a 348-hp edition available as well. While the GTO won immediate approval from performance buffs, it had GM executives pulling out their gray hair. But when sales totaled 32,450 units in '64—six times the forecast—the execs relented.


■ 1964½ Ford Mustang. In the early 1960s, young people were looking at cars different from their parents' vehicles, specifically something low-priced but sporty. Ford, economizing by using the Falcon platform, responded with the Mustang on April 17, 1964 Built on a 108 inch



set a first-year sales record of 417,000 units.

1984 Chrysler minivans. These vehicles invented an automotive category and proved a bigger hit than even Chrysler imagined, replacing the station wagon as the people-carrier of choice.

■ 1986 Ford Taurus. Taurus is noteworthy because it represented a huge risk. At the time, GM dominated the midsize car market. Midsize cars, the thinking went, had to be wedge-shaped and sport only two doors. The four-door sedan was for old fogies. Ford gambled on a rounded, aero shape with four doors — and chief designer Jack Telnack hit the jackpot.
