

The 2004 GTO, a time for GTOAA opportunity or take a step backwards?

In order to get things going with some written articles for our newsletter and get some points in the process, I thought I would start off with a lightning rod topic, the new 2004 GTO. What other issue right now is more debated, discussed and contested amongst GTO enthusiasts or for that matter car enthusiasts of all types? What other issue do people seem to have such strong opinions on? I cannot think of a better topic to write about right here and now, so here we go. Hopefully this will spur some other future articles from members with their opinions and thoughts on this topic!

I write this after having attended both POCI and GTO Natls, having had the opportunity to see the new 2004 GTO in person and up close. Prior to these events, like most of you, my only viewing of the car came from pictures over the internet, etc. I won't spend much time going into my personal thoughts about the car (I do like the car and know many in our club do too!), rather my article centers on the reintroduction and it's seemingly cold reception by the GTOAA membership (those attending nationals).

Who can argue the benefits of the following:

1) Pontiac/GM is bringing back the nameplate of one of the best American cars ever made and in most respectable fashion, V8 with 340HP, rear wheel drive and other performance traits making it The best performing GTO ever as well as one of the best performance American cars in the present day.

Yeah, I know, no hood scoop and they messed with the badges, but it is still an awesome car!

2) Bringing back this car and welcoming those who buy the car will significantly expand our hobby and interest to an array of new people including those who had GTOs in years past, those who always wanted one and never could afford one and even those who were too young and were not around back then but are impressed with the heritage of the car and what the new car has to offer. I think the most important element of all this is that it will bring a tremendous amount of newer, younger people into the fold. After all as we all grow older, who is going to want to continue to keep these great cars alive and well?

What inspired me to write something about this was the result of having attended the GTOAA Natls in Columbus. Here it was clearly evident that the masses attending the GTOAA meet did not seem to appreciate, support or desire to have one of these cars, nor did there seem to be any interest in giving anyone purchasing one of these fine cars the same

amount of hospitality and courtesy that owners of earlier GTOs have. Seems that there were similar sentiments some years ago and probably still some today for those who have '73 or '74 GTOs. While our club openly supports and appreciates GTOs of all types, I know there are clubs out there that to this day treat those club members a bit differently.

To start, one of the afternoon meeting sessions held at Natls. was on the new GTO. In this meeting, a gentleman from Pontiac/GM, who I believe was product manager or marketing manager for the new GTO spoke. In his opening remarks he commented on the beauty of all the GTOs present at Natls and stated his appreciation for all attending who continue to preserve and perpetuate the heritage of the GTO. You could truly sense that this man understood and appreciated the significance and prominence of the GTO and those in attendance. Bottom line this guy really enjoyed the old cars as I'm sure other Pontiac/GM top brass do. The spokesman went on to say that the car must stand on it's own merits today and that the new GTO was not intended or designed to be a retro car for PMD. In actuality he stated the car as it looks is probably a very close interpretation of what the car would have looked if production have never ceased in 1974. He explained that Retro cars while appealing to those who love and own the old ones, is not practical for a car maker wanting wide spread appeal and to attract buyers from all types of backgrounds. I would agree with this. Who can argue this when you look at the demise of the new T-Bird and the supposedly slowing sales on the new VW Beetle. After these remarks were made, the questions over lack of hood scoops, red lines, hood tachs, newer GTO emblem/badging, etc. began to flow. My perception of all of this is that members in the GTOAA feel slighted that members of the organization were not consulted with as to how and what the car should be. How reasonable is this? This new car is big business, it is not like a hobby for us. In order to be a successful car, the new GTO will have to have widespread popularity and appeal, much more so than the appeal value from an organization of 10,000 can offer. If you think Pontiac really gives a hoot about what present GTO owners think, you are mistaken. The future success of this newly reintroduced car hinges on the acceptance from the general population, not the GTOAA or it's membership.

At the awards banquet, which was also the end of the convention, Bill M., president of the GTOAA, tried to solicit a rousing show of support for the new GTO given that next year will be the 40th anniversary of the car. Bill asked for a show of hands and applause in the crowd of 200 or more for who would be willing to purchase one of the new GTOs. I think 3 people applauded including myself. How embarrassing for the GTOAA as an organization! In my opinion, the GTOAA is giving off differing messages as they ask for support via applause at a group dinner to show the membership's support of the new car while on the other hand they debate over a "special handling" of new GTO owners for display purposes only for upcoming conventions. Does not sound too welcoming in my opinion.

I know our club will openly accept and welcome those who decide to purchase one of the new cars and join our club. Hopefully the GTOAA and it's clubs across the country will do the same. It is the right thing to do and is what's best for the association.




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
