

GTO of the Month

As some of you know, I have been obsessed with Pontiacs for all of my life. So naturally, my first car was a Pontiac, a 1963 Tempest. It has been almost 10 years since I got that car. Since then I have managed to blow up my Dad's Grand Prix, and learned how to drive stick on a 05 Sunfire. A little over a year ago I got a lifted Jeep Cherokee as a daily driver. While the Jeep is fine around town and on anything that isn't a road, it wasn't particularly enjoyable to drive out on the highway. The whole tall, brick shape made passing a gas station not an option.

So, I started to search for a GTO. The decision to get another Pontiac stemmed from the financial independence with my new job in Southern Illinois, as well as the yearning I had to drive a manual on a more regular basis. The search began for a GTO, preferably one with an LS2. Unfortunately, my requirements made the search tough. The color had to be Cyclone Gray, it had to have a manual, and it needed to have relatively low miles. Around the 4th of July I found one in Texas with all of the boxes checked, and it had the more desirable 18 inch wheels, but that deal fell

A few weeks later, a 2006 Cyclone Gray, 6-speed GTO came up on EBay that looked very nice. I was hesitant though, because it was located in Detroit and I didn't want to buy it without anyone verifying that it was what they claimed it to be. Luckily my Dad, Brian Ray, remembered that fellow club member Shauna Wollmershauser was going to school up that way. So, we gave her a call and she was more than willing to go over the next day to take a look at it. After she verified it was good, I contacted the dealer and we worked out a deal. The hard part was figuring out how to get it back to Illinois.

That following weekend my folks drove up to St. Louis and I flew there from my local airport (Marion, IL) to St. Louis. After a few hours sleep, my Dad and I caught a 6am flight out of St. Louis to Detroit, with a changeover in Chicago. Shauna picked us up from the airport and we went over to get the car. The best part was after we got the car I got to cruise down Woodward Avenue to a local eatery, then buy Shauna lunch for all that she had done. From Detroit, we drove my new GTO the 8+ hours (550+ miles) straight back to Southern Illinois.



After 48 Years Making the Rounds, Jimmy Crowe's Kaiser Returns Home

After 48 Years Making Its Rounds, Jimmie Crowe's Kaiser Returns Home

How many people can remember Jimmie Crowe's 1954 Kaiser cruising the streets of Columbia in the 1950s and 60s? That two-toned blue car has had quite an odyssey and has now returned to our family.

From the mid 1930s until he retired in 1974, my dad Jimmie Crowe had a business in Columbia known as Jimmie Crowe Auto Repair. In the early 1950s, the business was also a Willys dealer. In 1953 Kaiser Motors took over Willys-Overland and changed the name to Willys Motors. Jimmie sold both Willys and Kaiser cars.

In 1955, Kaiser ended car production in the U.S. and he had one 1954 Kaiser Manhattan left in the inventory. My dad decided to drive it for his own use rather than sell it. After driving it for about two years, he felt it was underpowered and installed a 1956 Oldsmobile engine in the Kaiser.

The Kaiser was the Crowe's family car for 12 years. My brother Jim, my sister JoAnn and I (Tootie) all learned to drive in that car. Our family and friends all have memories of it. The Kaiser was used for vacations, proms and weddings. As we kids married and moved on, Dad no longer needed the Kaiser and he sold it in February of 1967. The car was out of our family for 48 years.

This year, our former neighbor, Joe Sander of Columbia, who lived across the street from the garage in the 50s, was vacationing with relatives in Maine. One afternoon, the ladies decided to go clothes shopping and the guys went to look at old cars.

When Joe saw the twotoned blue '54 Kaiser he immediately looked at it more closely. When he saw that it had a '56 Oldsmobile engine in it, he was positive that it was our old car. When Joe returned home he came by our house and showed us a picture of the completely restored car and gave us the name of the car dealership where he found it. We could not believe it.

The next Monday our son Tim May got in touch through e-mails with the dealership


and found out that the car was originally from Illinois. The dealer sent Tim a few photos of the paperwork on the car. Lo and behold, among those papers Tim saw one sheet that was from Jimmie Crowe Auto Repair letterhead. The paperwork showed the 1967 sale of the Kaiser to Kenneth Linsey of Springfield with our mother's handwriting.

Mom, Flora (nee Weil-

bacher) Crowe, took care of all the bookkeeping for Dad's garage and she had signed Dad's name with her initials below. When each of us saw Mom's handwriting, that was all the proof we needed that we had indeed found Dad's car.

After a couple of more phone calls and a little haggling, we purchased the car. The car left Maine on Friday, Sept. 18, by transport and arrived here on Tuesday, Sept. 22. Since then we have had several phone conversations with Kenneth Linsey who bought the car back in 1967 and now lives in Normal. We really need to thank him, since he is the one who preserved it for over 45 years.

We are thrilled that the blue Kaiser is finally home again in Columbia. Our son, Phil May is now the owner of his grandfather's car.

Gateway GTO Visits the Old Missouri State Penitentiary By Chris Winslow

We are always looking for something new and different to do at Gateway GTO. This time Saundra Melrose came up with an activity that certainly fit that description. She organized a tour of the old Missouri State Penitentiary near Jefferson City. This facility closed down a bit over a decade ago, but it has a long history with some buildings on the grounds dating back to the 1860's.



Our cruise started out at the Super Smokers in Eureka, Missouri near Six Flags for a good lunch to tide us over for the drive to Jefferson City.

From there we gathered up everyone and headed west on Highway 50 for the cruise to the prison. The weather was perfect, so everyone was driving their GTOs. The only disappointing thing is that we appeared to have been a few weeks early for the fall colors.

We arrived at the prison with all of the GTO's making it without any issues. We had taken the opportunity to try out the club's new 2 way radios and found that they worked much better than the old ones that we had historically used on these cruises. At times we were able to communicate at distances of up to two miles.





Once at the prison, we started out at the museum. It had a very interesting collection of historical photographs, artifacts from the days when the prison was in operation, and furniture

and other crafts that had been made over the years by the prisoners.

As an electrical engineer, one artifact that caught my attention was the box used to control lethal injections.

After we finished looking around the museum, it was time to head down the street to the prison entrance for our scheduled tour.

Our tour guide was a very knowledgeable former employee of the prison. He had started working there



in 1993 and continued to work there until the prison closed in the early 2000's. He had a number of stories from his time there, including stories of eating the same food as the inmates



(sometimes with a bonus serving of roaches!).

Our first stop on the tour was the oldest building still standing on the complex, an old cell block that was built in the mid 1800's. It was a 4 story building that at one point was housing 5 prisoners per cell.





It was hard to imagine what it would have been like in the days when that building first opened. There was no indoor plumbing, so in the cell that was shared between 5 inmates, there was a 2 bucket system for restroom purposes. In later years, it was updated to add running water to each cell and occupancy was reduced to 2 inmates per cell, but that was many decades later. For prisoners that wound up there before WWII, life would have been nearly unbearable.

The tour guide next took us down to the dungeons. These were cells in the basement of the building that had no windows or fresh air. They would lock prisoners in those cells for punishment. Once inside the cell with the door closed, there was no light at all and the thick walls and doors blocked out any sound. It was total sensory deprivation. Usage of these cells was discontinued in



the later years that the facility was in operation.

We next toured a newer prison block. It was a bit brighter than the ancient building that we started in, and had been designed from the beginning with indoor plumbing. In fact, in poking around the open cells, there were even cable TV hookups that had been retrofitted into the



building at some point before it had been shut down.

Finally, we jumped back into the cars and drove around to the other side of the complex to see the execution chamber. In this building numerous executions had taken place. Most had been performed with poison gas, but the last one had been done with lethal injection using the machine in the mu-







seum. It was interesting to note that when they were using the poison gas, once the prisoner had died, they simply opened a vent in the building and let the gas escape into the atmosphere. One can only imagine what environmental groups these days would have to say about that practice!

The Melrose's had planned a photo op for Tom Oxler, including props. They got Tom to sit in the execution chair and then fitted him with an electrocution helmet and orange jumper. Once

he was in the chair, Mark pulled out an old Frankenstien looking dual blade knife switch.

After the tour was over, most of the group headed out to Oscar's restaurant for dinner and then after dinner a few of the couples spent the night at the Best Western for "Shots with the Schotts" and some games.

It was a really fun and unique event. Thanks to the Melrose's for putting it together.

The project requires six **BONE STOCK** new age GTO's - One manual transmission and one automatic transmission car from each model year.

Ground Rules for Eligible Cars:

- Car must be bone stock with NO aftermarket parts or modifications. The only exceptions are batteries and tires.
- Factory parts, such as the sports appearance package and 18 inch wheels, are allowed.
- All parts the car was originally supplied with, such as the spoiler, must be installed. (Exception: Parts removed to install other factory parts such as the sports appearance package or 18" wheels.)

Once the cars are identified, a photo session will be scheduled.
